

- Construction of Clarendon was financed with Federal funds in the amount of \$383,576, supplemented with district building funds. Estimated cost was \$425,000. There was a delay of one year due to obtaining approval of federal funds.
- The plant at first consisted of seven separate buildings, including the administration building, three classroom wings; a multi-purpose building, housing the lunchroom and serving as an auditorium; library, shop, arts and crafts building; and a garage to house busses for the entire district and to provide warehouse space.
 Clarendon School was started in July 17, 1953, and
- ready for occupancy in February, 1954.

 The school has always been a leader in instrumental music.

- World champion shot-put thrower Dallas Long graduated from Clarendon.
- Professional football player Gordon Smith is also a graduate.
 C. J. DeWitt was named principal in January of 1954. He was Encanto's principal five years previous and taught in the district 12 years previous to coming to
- the Encanto School.

 Clarendon was built to house 450 children, but 650 moved in on opening day.

 In 1955, six classrooms were added, and in 1962, when students came from Old Osborn, three more classrooms.
- a band room, and storage room were built.
 Named "Clarendon" because the new school faced Clarendon Avenue. Encanto youngsters entered a contest to name the sister school.
- Clarendon School pioneered many worthwhile projects such as "controlled reading" for upper grades; modern mathematics as a part of the curriculum; and the school's student body government by-laws and constitution have been copied by schools all over the nation. Mr. DeWitt wrote a thesis for his M.A. degree on this
- project.
 2200 students have graduated during the last eleven years.
